The competitiveness of a country depends heavily on its infrastructure: education, transport, power. The French power system used to be one of the best in the world, accident-free and providing an uninterrupted supply of high-quality electricity at low cost.

Since the 1980s, however, foolish and arrogant politicians, dismal hybrids of Gamelin and Stavisky, have made it their business to introduce “renewable energy” – wind and solar power – that nobody needed. Vast subsidies have damaged the competitiveness of the system as a whole, yet not a single business from this industry has ever achieved profitability. Due to their intermittent nature, wind and solar power are fundamentally uncompetitive. There were no grounds, no evidence and no analysis to support this decision, which was taken purely for reasons of ideology and doctrine.

Today, the cost of our power is rising incessantly, its quality is difficult to maintain, and as a direct result of these politicized manoeuvres, there are over six million unemployed.

The politicians behind these decisions and the institutions which have supported, defended and justified them in defiance of all evidence, all science and all conscience will one day be held to account. As Chateaubriand said, “Nero prospers in vain; Tacitus is already born within the Empire”.
